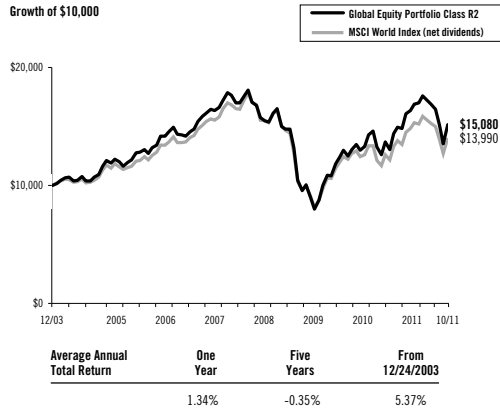

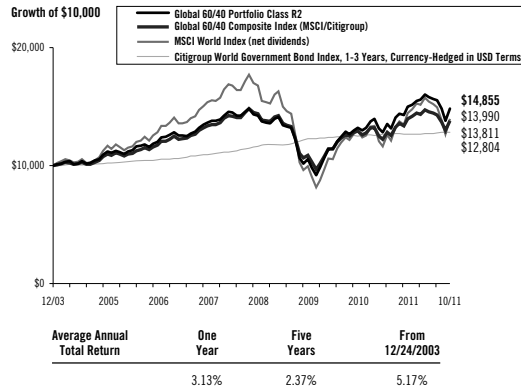

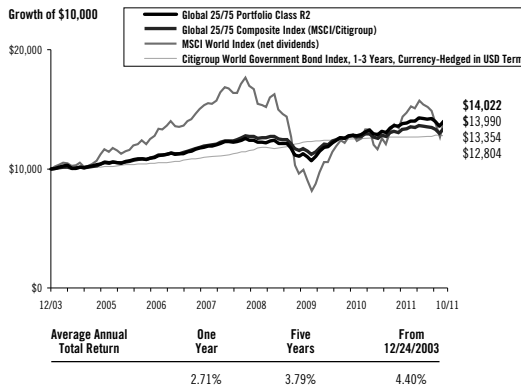

December 24, 2003-October 31, 2011

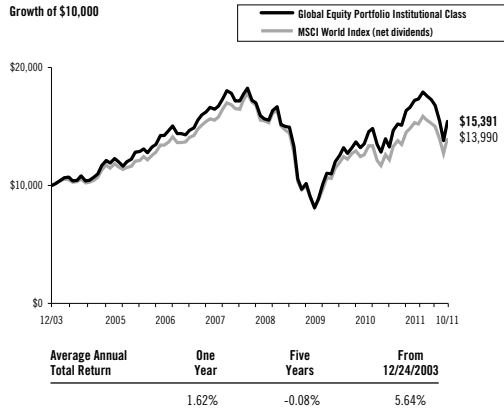

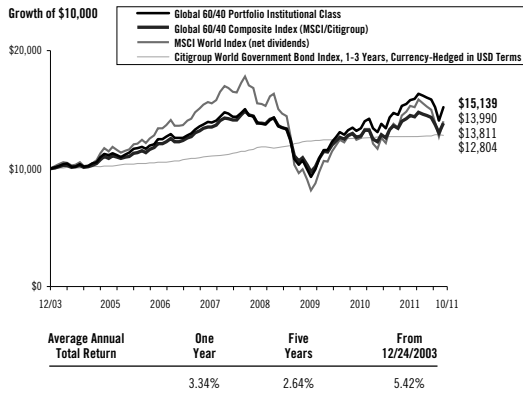

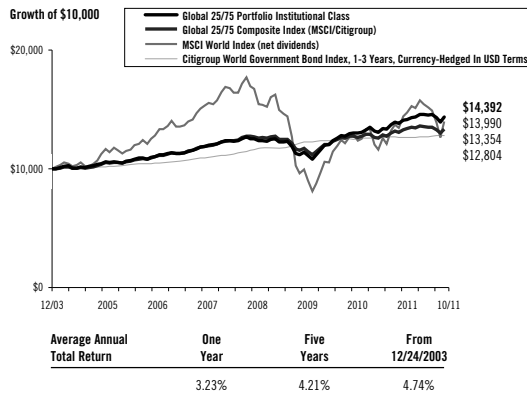

**MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS**

**Global Equity Portfolio**

**12 Months Ended October 31, 2011**

The Global Equity Portfolio seeks long-term capital appreciation by investing in a combination of mutual funds managed by Dimensional Fund Advisors LP. As of the date of this report, domestic funds include the U.S. Core Equity 1 Portfolio, the U.S. Core Equity 2 Portfolio, and the DFA Real Estate Securities Portfolio; and international funds include the International Core Equity Portfolio, the Emerging Markets Core Equity Portfolio and The Canadian Small Company Series (collectively, the "Equity Underlying Funds"). The investment strategy is process driven, emphasizing broad diversification and consistent exposure in each Equity Underlying Fund to stocks with desired asset class characteristics. As of October 31, 2011, the Equity Underlying Funds held more than 12,000 equity securities in 44 countries.

For the 12 months ended October 31, 2011, total returns were 1.62% for the Portfolio's Institutional Class shares, 1.34% for the Portfolio's Class R2 shares, and 1.76% for the MSCI World Index (net dividends). As a result of the Equity Underlying Funds' diversified investment approach, performance was determined principally by broad structural trends in global equity markets rather than the behavior of a limited group of stocks in a particular industry or country. Global small cap stocks, which were included in the Portfolio but largely excluded from the Index, generally outperformed global large cap stocks; however, global value stocks which were weighted more heavily in the Portfolio than in the Index, generally underperformed non-value stocks. The Portfolio's higher relative allocation to U.S. securities benefited relative performance as the U.S. represented some of the highest equity returns in the world. The Portfolio's allocation to emerging markets, which were excluded from the Index, detracted from relative performance as that category of countries generally underperformed developed markets. The time of valuation of currency and fair valuation adjustments can create differences between the performance of the Portfolio and the Index.

**Global 60/40 Portfolio**

The Global 60/40 Portfolio seeks capital appreciation and current income by investing in a combination of mutual funds managed by Dimensional Fund Advisors LP. As of the date of this report, domestic equity funds include the U.S. Core Equity 1 Portfolio, the U.S. Core Equity 2 Portfolio, and the DFA Real Estate Securities Portfolio; international equity funds include the International Core Equity Portfolio, and the Emerging Markets Core Equity Portfolio; and fixed income funds include the DFA Short-Term Extended Quality Portfolio, the DFA Five-Year Global Fixed Income Portfolio, the DFA Inflation Protected Securities Portfolio, the DFA Selectively Hedged Global Fixed Income Portfolio, and the DFA Intermediate-Term Extended Quality Portfolio (collectively, the "Equity and Fixed Income Underlying Funds"). The investment strategy is process driven, emphasizing broad diversification and consistent exposure in each Equity and Fixed Income Underlying Fund to equity or fixed income securities with desired asset class characteristics. As of October 31, 2011, the Equity and Fixed Income Underlying Funds held more than 12,000 equity securities in 44 countries and approximately 800 fixed income securities in 16 countries, excluding supranationals.

For the 12 months ended October 31, 2011, total returns were 3.34% for the Portfolio's Institutional Class shares, 3.13% for the Portfolio's Class R2 shares, and 1.79% for a hypothetical composite index composed of 60% MSCI World Index (net dividends) and 40% Citigroup World Government Bond Index, 1-3 Years, Currency-Hedged in USD Terms. As a result of the Equity and Fixed Income Underlying Funds' diversified investment approach, performance was determined principally by broad structural trends in global equity and fixed income markets rather than the behavior of a limited group of securities in a particular industry, country, or asset class. With respect to the Portfolio's equity component, global small cap stocks, which were included in the Portfolio but largely excluded from the Index, generally outperformed global large cap stocks; however, global value stocks which were weighted more heavily in the Portfolio than in the Index, generally underperformed non-value stocks. The Portfolio's higher relative allocation to U.S. equity securities benefited relative performance as the U.S. represented some of the highest equity returns in the world. The Portfolio's allocation to emerging markets equity

securities, which were excluded from the Index, detracted from relative performance as that category of countries generally underperformed developed markets. The time of valuation of currency and fair valuation adjustments can create differences between the performance of the Portfolio and the Index.

Outperformance of the Portfolio's fixed income component, relative to the fixed income component of the Index, was primarily attributable to the longer duration of the fixed income component of the Portfolio relative to the index during a period of falling nominal and real interest rates. The Portfolio's average allocation during the period of approximately 48% of the fixed income component in securities with maturities longer than those in the fixed income component Index accounts for more than half of the outperformance. Further contributing to outperformance was the Portfolio's allocation to unhedged non-U.S. Dollar fixed income securities through its holdings in the DFA Selectively Hedged Global Fixed Income Portfolio during a period when a number of its currencies strengthened relative to the U.S. Dollar. The fixed income index is composed of short-term U.S. Dollar hedged sovereign government securities.

### **Global 25/75 Portfolio**

The Global 25/75 Portfolio seeks total return consistent with current income and preservation of capital with some capital appreciation by investing in a combination of mutual funds managed by Dimensional Fund Advisors LP. As of the date of this report, domestic equity funds include the U.S. Core Equity 1 Portfolio, the U.S. Core Equity 2 Portfolio, and the DFA Real Estate Securities Portfolio; international equity funds include the International Core Equity Portfolio and the Emerging Markets Core Equity Portfolio; and fixed income funds include the DFA Two-Year Global Fixed Income Portfolio, the DFA Inflation-Protected Securities Portfolio, and the DFA Short-Term Extended Quality Portfolio (collectively, the "Equity and Fixed Income Underlying Funds"). The investment strategy is process driven, emphasizing broad diversification and consistent exposure in each Equity and Fixed Income Underlying Fund to equity or fixed income securities with desired asset class characteristics. As of October 31, 2011, the Equity and Fixed Income Underlying Funds held more than 12,000 equity securities, through its underlying funds, in 44 countries and approximately 500 fixed income securities in 16 countries, excluding supranationals.

For the 12 months ended October 31, 2011, total returns were 3.23% for the Portfolio Institutional Class shares, 2.71% for the Portfolio's Class R2 shares, and 1.36% for a hypothetical index composed of 25% MSCI World Index (net dividends) and 75% Citigroup World Government Bond Index, 1-3 Years, Currency-Hedged in USD Terms. As a result of the Equity and Fixed Income Underlying Funds' diversified investment approach, performance was determined principally by broad structural trends in global equity and fixed income markets rather than the behavior of a limited group of securities in a particular industry, country, or asset class. With respect to the Portfolio's equity component, global small cap stocks, which were included in the Portfolio but largely excluded from the Index, generally outperformed global large cap stocks; however, global value stocks which were weighted more heavily in the Portfolio than in the Index, generally underperformed non-value stocks. The Portfolio's higher relative allocation to U.S. equity securities benefited relative performance as the U.S. represented some of the highest equity returns in the world. The Portfolio's allocation to emerging markets equity securities, which were excluded from the Index, detracted from relative performance as that category of countries generally underperformed developed markets. The time of valuation of currency and fair valuation adjustments can create differences between the performance of the Portfolio and the Index.

Outperformance of the Portfolio's fixed income component, relative to the fixed income component of the Index, was primarily attributable to the longer duration of the fixed income component of the Portfolio relative to the index during a period of falling nominal and real interest rates. The Portfolio's average allocation during the period of approximately 39% of the fixed income component in securities with maturities longer than those in the fixed income component Index accounted for approximately 70% of the outperformance. In particular, the fixed income component's exposure to the DFA Inflation-Protected Securities Portfolio was a significant cause of outperformance. The fixed income index is composed of short-term U.S. Dollar hedged sovereign government securities.

**DISCLOSURE OF FUND EXPENSES**  
**(Unaudited)**

The following Expense Tables are shown so that you can understand the impact of fees on your investment. All mutual funds have operating expenses. As a shareholder of the fund, you incur ongoing costs, which include costs for portfolio management, administrative services, and shareholder reports, among others. Operating expenses, legal and audit services, which are deducted from a fund's gross income, directly reduce the investment return of the fund. A fund's expenses are expressed as a percentage of its average net assets. This figure is known as the expense ratio. The following examples are intended to help you understand the ongoing costs, in dollars, of investing in the fund and to compare these costs with those of other mutual funds. The examples are based on an investment of \$1,000 made at the beginning of the period shown and held for the entire period.

The Expense Tables below illustrate your fund's costs in two ways.

**Actual Fund Return**

This section helps you to estimate the actual expenses after fee waivers that you paid over the period. The "Ending Account Value" shown is derived from the fund's actual return and "Expenses Paid During Period" reflect the dollar amount that would have been paid by an investor who started with \$1,000 in the fund. You may use the information here, together with the amount you invested, to estimate the expenses that you paid over the period.

To do so, simply divide your account value by \$1,000 (for example, a \$7,500 account value divided by \$1,000 = 7.5), then multiply the result by the number given for your fund under the heading "Expenses Paid During Period."

**Hypothetical Example for Comparison Purposes**

This section is intended to help you compare your fund's costs with those of other mutual funds. The hypothetical "Ending Account Value" and "Expenses Paid During Period" are derived from the fund's actual expense ratio and an assumed 5% annual return before expenses. In this case, because the return used is not the fund's actual return, the results do not apply to your investment. The example is useful in making comparisons because the SEC requires all mutual funds to calculate expenses based on a 5% annual return. You can assess your fund's costs by comparing this hypothetical example with the hypothetical examples that appear in shareholder reports of other funds.

Please note that the expenses shown in the tables are meant to highlight and help you compare ongoing costs only and do not reflect any transactional costs, if applicable. The "Annualized Expense Ratio" represents the actual expenses for the six-month period indicated.

**NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

**A. Organization:**

Dimensional Investment Group Inc. (the “Fund”) is an open-end management investment company registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, whose shares are offered to institutional investors, retirement plans and clients of registered investment advisors. The Fund currently offers fifteen portfolios, of which Global Equity Portfolio, Global 60/40 Portfolio and Global 25/75 Portfolio (each a “Global Fund” and collectively, the “Global Funds”) are presented in this report. The remaining portfolios are presented in separate reports.

The Global Funds achieve their investment objectives by primarily investing in other portfolios within DFA Investment Dimensions Group Inc. (“IDG”) and The DFA Investment Trust Company (“ITC”) (collectively, the “Master Funds”).

At a regular meeting of the Board of Directors/Trustees (the “Board”) on September 16, 2008, the Board voted to change the fiscal and tax year ends of the Global Funds from November 30 to October 31.

**B. Significant Accounting Policies:**

The following significant accounting policies are in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Such policies are consistently followed by the Fund in preparation of its financial statements. The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the fair value of investments and reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of increases and decreases in net assets from operations during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates and those differences could be material.

1. *Security Valuation:* The Global Funds utilize a fair value hierarchy which prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value into three broad levels as described below:

- Level 1 – quoted prices in active markets for identical securities

- Level 2 – other significant observable inputs (including quoted prices for similar securities, interest rates, prepayment speeds, credit risk, etc.)
- Level 3 – significant unobservable inputs (including the Global Funds' own assumptions in determining the fair value of investments)

Master Fund shares held by the Global Funds are valued at their respective daily net asset values, as these Master Funds are treated as regulated investment companies. The Global Funds' investments in partnerships reflect proportionate interest in the net assets of their corresponding partnerships. These securities are generally categorized as Level 1 in the hierarchy.

A summary of the inputs used to value the Global Funds' net assets by each major security type is disclosed at the end of the Schedule of Investments. The inputs or methodology used for valuing securities are not necessarily an indication of the risk associated with investing in those securities.

The Global Funds did not have any significant transfers between Level 1 and Level 2 during the year ended October 31, 2011.

2. *Deferred Compensation Plan:* Each eligible Director of the Fund may elect participation in The Fee Deferral Plan for Independent Directors and Trustees (the "Plan"). Under the Plan, effective January 1, 2002, such Directors may defer payment of all or a portion of their total fees earned as a Director. These deferred amounts may be treated as though such amounts had been invested in shares of the following funds: U.S. Large Cap Value Portfolio; U.S. Core Equity 1 Portfolio; U.S. Core Equity 2 Portfolio; U.S. Vector Equity Portfolio; U.S. Micro Cap Portfolio; DFA International Value Portfolio; International Core Equity Portfolio; Emerging Markets Portfolio; Emerging Markets Core Equity Portfolio; and/or DFA Two-Year Global Fixed Income Portfolio. Contributions made under the Plan and the change in unrealized appreciation (depreciation) and income are included in Directors'/Trustees' Fees & Expenses.

Each Director has the option to receive their distribution of proceeds in one of the following methods: lump sum; annual installments over a period of agreed upon years; or quarterly installments over a period of agreed upon years. Each Director shall have the right in a notice of election to defer compensation (the "Notice") to elect to defer the receipt of the Director's deferred compensation until a date specified by such Director in the Notice, which date may not be sooner than the earlier of: (i) the first business day of January following the year in which such Director ceases to be a member of the Board of the Fund; and (ii) five years following the effective date of the Director's first deferral election. If a Director who elects to defer fees fails to designate in the Notice a time or date as of which payment of the Director's deferred fee account shall commence, payment of such amount shall commence as of the first business day of January following the year in which the Director ceases to be a member of the Board of the Fund (unless the Director files an amended Notice selecting a different distribution date). As of October 31, 2011, none of the Directors have requested or received a distribution of proceeds of a deferred fee account.

3. *Other:* Security transactions are accounted for as of the trade date. Costs used in determining realized gains and losses on the sale of affiliated investment company shares are on the basis of identified cost. Dividend income and distributions to shareholders are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Distributions received from the investment in affiliated investment companies that represent a return of capital or capital gain are recorded as a reduction of cost of investments or as a realized gain, respectively. The Global Funds estimate the character of distributions received that may be considered return of capital distributions. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Expenses directly attributable to a Global Fund are directly charged. Common expenses of the Fund are allocated using methods approved by the Board of Directors/Trustees, generally based on average net assets.

Class R2 Shares and Institutional Class Shares have equal rights to assets and earnings of its Global Fund. Income, gains and losses, and common expenses of each Global Fund are allocated to each class of shares based on its relative net assets. Each class will bear its own class-specific expenses, if any.

### **C. Investment Advisor:**

Dimensional Fund Advisors LP ("Dimensional" or the "Advisor") provides investment advisory services to the Master Funds. The Advisor also provides administrative services to the Global Funds, including supervision of services provided by others, providing information to shareholders and the Board of Directors/Trustees, and other

administrative services. For the year ended October 31, 2011, the Global Equity Portfolio, Global 60/40 Portfolio and Global 25/75 Portfolio's administrative services fees were accrued daily and paid monthly to the Advisor based on an effective annual rate of 0.30%, 0.25%, 0.20%, respectively, of average daily net assets. The Global Funds do not pay separate management fees to the Advisor.

Pursuant to a Fee Waiver and Expense Assumption Agreement, in order to limit the total administration and management fees received by the Advisor, the Advisor has contractually agreed to waive its administration fee each Global Fund pays to the extent necessary to limit the proportionate share of the total combined administration fees paid by each of the Global Funds and management fees paid by the Master Funds to the Advisor. The maximum amount waived under this waiver is the full amount of a Global Fund's administration fee to the Advisor. The Fee Waiver and Expense Assumption Agreement will remain in effect through February 28, 2012, and shall continue to remain in effect from year to year thereafter unless terminated by the Fund or the Advisor. For the year ended October 31, 2011, the Global Funds had the following combined administration fee limits based on a percentage of average net assets on an annualized basis.

Previously waived fees subject to future recovery by the Advisor over periods not exceeding April 30, 2014 are reflected below (amounts in thousands). The Global Funds are not obligated to reimburse the Advisor for fees previously waived or expenses previously assumed by the Advisor more than thirty-six months before the date of recovery.

## F. Federal Income Taxes:

Each Global Fund has qualified and intends to continue to qualify as a regulated investment company under Subchapter M of the Internal Revenue Code for federal income tax purposes and to distribute substantially all of its taxable income and net capital gains to its shareholders. Accordingly, no provision has been made for federal income taxes.

Distributions from net investment income and net realized gains are determined in accordance with U.S. federal income tax regulations, which may differ from those amounts determined under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. These book/tax differences are either temporary or permanent in nature. To the extent these differences are permanent, they are charged or credited to paid-in capital, undistributed net investment income or accumulated net realized gains, as appropriate, in the period that the differences arise. Accordingly, the following permanent differences as of October 31, 2011, primarily attributable to the utilization of accumulated earnings and profits distributed to shareholders on redemptions of shares as part of the dividends paid deduction for income tax purposes, were reclassified to the following accounts. #### H. Line of Credit:

The Fund, together with other Dimensional-advised portfolios, has entered into a \$250 million unsecured discretionary line of credit effective June 22, 2011 with its domestic custodian bank. Each portfolio is permitted to borrow, subject to its investment limitations, up to a maximum of \$250 million, as long as total borrowings under the line of credit do not exceed \$250 million in the aggregate. Borrowings under the line of credit are charged interest at the rates agreed to by the parties at the time of borrowing. Each portfolio is individually, and not jointly, liable for its particular advances under the line of credit. There is no commitment fee on the unused portion of the line of credit. The agreement for the discretionary line of credit may be terminated by either party at any time. The line of credit is scheduled to expire on June 22, 2012. There were no borrowings by the Global Funds under this line of credit during the year ended October 31, 2011.

The Fund, together with other Dimensional-advised portfolios, has also entered into an additional \$500 million unsecured line of credit effective January 15, 2011 with its international custodian bank. Each portfolio is permitted to borrow, subject to its investment limitations, up to a maximum of \$500 million, as long as total borrowings under the line of credit do not exceed \$500 million in the aggregate. Each portfolio is individually, and not jointly, liable for its particular advances under the line of credit. Borrowings under the line of credit are charged interest at rates agreed to by the parties at the time of borrowing. There is no commitment fee on the unused portion of the line of

credit. The agreement for the line of credit expires on January 13, 2012. The Fund, together with other Dimensional-advised portfolios, expects to enter into a new line of credit with substantially the same terms as its existing line of credit prior to its expiration.

**I. Shareholder Servicing Fees:**

The Class R2 Shares pay a shareholder servicing fee in the amount of 0.25% of their annual average net assets to compensate service agents that provide shareholder servicing, record keeping, account maintenance and other services to investors in the Global Funds' Class R2 Shares.

**J. Indemnitees; Contractual Obligations:**

Under the Fund's organizational documents, its officers and directors are indemnified against certain liabilities arising out of the performance of their duties to the Fund.

In the normal course of business, the Fund enters into contracts that contain a variety of representations and warranties which provide general indemnification. The Fund's maximum exposure under these arrangements is unknown as this would involve future claims that may be made against the Fund and/or its affiliates that have not yet occurred. However, based on experience, the Fund expects the risk of loss to be remote.

**K. Recently Issued Accounting Standards:**

In January 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") issued Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") No. 2010-06 "Improving Disclosures about Fair Value Measurements." ASU No. 2010-06 amends FASB Accounting Standards Codification Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, to require additional disclosures in the roll forward of activity in Level 3 fair value measurements effective for interim and annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2010. Management is currently evaluating the impact ASU No. 2010-06 will have on its financial statement disclosures.

In May 2011, the FASB issued ASU No. 2011-04 "Amendments to Achieve Common Fair Value Measurement and Disclosure Requirements in U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles ("GAAP") and International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRSs)." ASU 2011-04 includes common requirements for measurement of and disclosure about fair value between U.S. GAAP and IFRSs. ASU 2011-04 will require reporting entities to disclose quantitative information about the unobservable inputs used in the fair value measurements categorized within Level 3 of the fair value hierarchy. In addition, ASU 2011-04 will require reporting entities to make disclosures about amounts and reasons for all transfers in and out of Level 1 and Level 2 fair value measurements. The new and revised disclosures are effective for interim and annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2011. At this time, management is evaluating the implications of ASU No. 2011-04 and its impact on the financial statements has not been determined.

Under the recently enacted Regulated Investment Company Modernization Act of 2010, Funds will be permitted to carry forward capital losses incurred in taxable years beginning after December 22, 2010 for an unlimited period. However, any losses incurred during those future taxable years will be required to be utilized prior to the losses

incurred in pre-enactment taxable years. As a result of this ordering rule, pre-enactment capital loss carryforwards may be more likely to expire unused. Additionally, post enactment capital losses that are carried forward will retain their character as either short-term or long-term capital losses rather than being considered all short-term as under previous law.

Although management currently believes that resolving claims against us, individually or in aggregate, will not have a material adverse impact on our financial position, our results of operations, or our cash flows, these matters are subject to inherent uncertainties and management’s view of these matters may change in the future.

**M. Subsequent Event Evaluations:**

Management has evaluated the impact of all subsequent events on the Global Funds and has determined that there are no subsequent events requiring recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

### Trustees/Directors

Each Board of Trustees/Directors of The DFA Investment Trust Company Inc. (“DFAITC”), DFA Investment Dimensions Group Inc. (“DFAIDG”), Dimensional Investment Group Inc. (“DIG”) and Dimensional Emerging Markets Value Fund (“DEM”) (each, the “Fund” and collectively, the “Funds”) is responsible for establishing the Funds’ policies and for overseeing the management of the Funds. The Trustees/Directors of the Funds, including all of the disinterested Trustees/Directors, have adopted written procedures to monitor potential conflicts of interest that might develop between portfolios of the Funds (the “Feeder Portfolios”) that invest in certain series of DFAITC or DEM (the “Master Funds”).

Each Board has four standing committees, an Audit Committee, a Nominating Committee, a Portfolio Performance and Service Review Committee (the “Performance Committee”) and an Independent Review Committee (the “Review Committee”). The Audit Committee is comprised of George M. Constantinides, Roger G. Ibbotson and Abbie J. Smith. Each member of the Audit Committee is a disinterested Trustee/Director. The Audit Committee oversees the Fund’s accounting and financial reporting policies and practices, the Fund’s internal controls, the Fund’s financial statements and the independent audits thereof and performs other oversight functions as requested by the Board. The Audit Committee recommends the appointment of each Fund’s independent registered certified public accounting firm and also acts as a liaison between the Fund’s independent registered certified public accounting firm and the full Board. There were two Audit Committee meetings held during the fiscal year ended October 31, 2011.

Each Board’s Nominating Committee is comprised of George M. Constantinides, John P. Gould, Roger G. Ibbotson, Myron S. Scholes, Edward P. Lazear and Abbie J. Smith. Each member of the Nominating Committee is a disinterested Trustee/Director. The Nominating Committee for each Board makes recommendations for nominations of disinterested and interested members on the Board to the full Board. The Nominating Committee evaluates a candidate’s qualification for Board membership and the independence of such candidate from the Advisor and other principal service providers. There was one Nominating Committee meeting held for each Fund during the fiscal year ended October 31, 2011.

Each Board’s Performance Committee is comprised of George M. Constantinides, Roger G. Ibbotson, Abbie J. Smith, Edward P. Lazear, John P. Gould and Myron S. Scholes. Each member of the Performance Committee is a disinterested Trustee/Director. The Performance Committee regularly reviews and monitors the investment performance of the Fund’s series and reviews the performance of the Fund’s service providers. There were six Performance Committee meetings held during the fiscal year ended October 31, 2011.

Each Board’s Review Committee consists of both interested and disinterested Trustees/Directors. The Review Committee is comprised of John P. Gould, Edward P. Lazear, Myron S. Scholes and Eduardo A. Repetto. The Review Committee assists the Board in carrying out its fiduciary duties with respect to the oversight of the Fund and its performance. At the request of the Board or the Advisor, the Review Committee may (i) review the design of possible new series of the Fund, (ii) review performance of existing portfolios of the Fund and discuss and recommend possible enhancements to the portfolios’ investment strategies, (iii) review proposals by the Advisor to modify or enhance the investment strategies or policies of each portfolio, and (iv) consider issues relating to investment services for each portfolio of the Fund. The Review Committee was formed on December 17, 2010, and there were two Review Committee meetings held during the fiscal year ended October 31, 2011.
